

Praise the LORD

Introduction

Psalm 147 is the second in a series of five 'Hallelujah psalms' or psalms of praise (psalms 146 – 150) which taken together serve as a conclusion for the book of Psalms. United by the common theme of praise, each psalm begins with an exhortation to praise the LORD, followed by a description of why the LORD is indeed worthy of praise, followed by a final exhortation to praise the LORD in the light of who He is and what He has done.

Although the rationale for praise is slightly different in each psalm, the main emphasis across the collection is upon the LORD as Creator and Sustainer of the cosmos, the Lord over history and the Redeemer of and Provider for His people. This is particularly evident in Psalm 147, the longest psalm in the collection, which combines all of these reasons for praise.

Structurally, the psalm can be divided into three sections, each beginning with an exhortation either to praise (vs1), or sing to (vs 7) or to extol (vs12) the LORD, the final section also ending with a climactic exhortation to praise (vs20). What is particularly striking is that each section of the psalm speaks about the LORD's relationship to His creation and His relationship with His people. In this way the psalm reminds the reader that the LORD who redeems and cares for His people, is also the Creator and Sustainer of the whole cosmos and that the power that the LORD exercises on behalf of His people is the same power that He displayed in creation.
